Designation and Placement of Candidate Names on the Ballot

Pursuant to Utah Code § 20A-6-109, effective May 6, 2026, the name of each candidate shall appear on the ballot as the candidate's legal first name followed by the candidate's legal surname, unless the candidate has timely requested, and the election officer has approved, a permissible variation of the candidate's name. Permissible variations may include the use of a legal middle name or initial, a qualifying surname, a suffix, or a nickname by which the candidate is known in the county of residence, subject to the requirements established by statute. Where two or more candidates for the same office have the same or similar names, the election officer may include a candidate's legal middle name or otherwise differentiate the candidates as authorized by law.

Pursuant to Utah Code § 20A-6-110, effective May 6, 2026, the order in which candidates are listed on the ballot shall be determined using the master ballot position list established by the Lieutenant Governor. The election officer shall apply the randomized alphabet to the candidates' surnames and, where necessary, their legal first and middle names to determine ballot order. The candidate's legal name shall be used for purposes of determining ballot placement order, regardless of whether a variation of the candidate's name has been approved for appearance on the ballot.

County Ballot Propositions

OFFICIAL BALLOT FOR THE SALT LAKE COUNTY, UTAH LOCAL SPECIAL BOND ELECTION November 3, 2026

Shall Salt Lake County, Utah, be authorized to issue general obligation bonds in an amount not to exceed \$128,000,000 and to mature in no more than eleven (11) years from the date or dates of issuance of such bonds for the purpose of providing funds for repairing, completing, acquiring, constructing or renovating open space, natural habitat, parks, community trails and recreational facilities and other related facilities under the charge of the County and, to the extent necessary, for providing moneys for the refunding, at or prior to the maturity thereof, of general obligation bonds of the County authorized hereunder or heretofore issued and now outstanding?

PROPERTY TAX COST OF BONDS

A general obligation bond is a debt owed by the County. The County uses tax revenue to pay for the debt. If the bonds are issued as planned (which currently consists of 2 smaller issues of bonds totaling approximately \$128,000,000 over the next 5 years, with each issue of bonds maturing approximately 10 years from the date it is issued), without regard to the taxes currently levied to pay outstanding bonds that will decrease over time, an annual property tax to pay debt service on the proposed bonds will be required over a period of 10 years in the estimated amount of \$16.39 per year on a primary residence with the County average value of \$658,000 and in the estimated amount of \$29.80 per year on a business or secondary residence having the same value, which are equal to a monthly increase of \$1.37 for an average residential property and \$2.48 on a business property having the same value.

The County currently levies property taxes to pay debt service on other outstanding general obligation bonds that have been issued to finance voter approved projects. The incremental property taxes would decrease upon the repayment of the currently outstanding bonds, but the decrease may not occur if the proposed bonds are issued. Taking into account the repayment of the outstanding bonds, the County expects that the issuance of the proposed bonds, in the manner currently expected, will result in a net property tax increase of \$0 per year on a primary residence with the County average value of \$658,000 and a net property tax increase of \$0 per year on a business or secondary residence having the same value, which are equal to a monthly increase of \$0 for an average residential property and \$0 on a business property having the same value.

The foregoing is only an estimate and is not a limit on the amount of taxes that the governing body may be required to levy in order to pay debt service on the bonds. The governing body is obligated to levy taxes to the extent provided by law in order to pay the bonds.

In addition to the bond payment costs as outlined above, based on current best estimates, the average annual combined net operational and maintenance costs for these facilities during their

first ten years of operation is projected to require additional annual expenditures of \$4,710,200. If approved, the county will determine during its next budget cycle whether additional operational and maintenance costs may or may not require any additional funds from budget cuts or a tax increase.

OFFICIAL BALLOT PROPOSITION FOR THE SANDY CITY, UTAH SPECIAL BOND
ELECTION, NOVEMBER 3, 2026

PROPOSITION

Shall the City Council (the “Council”) of Sandy City, Utah (the “City”), be authorized to issue General Obligation Bonds in an amount not to exceed Thirty Million Dollars (\$30,000,000) (the “Bonds”) for the purpose of financing all or a portion of the costs of acquiring, developing, constructing, renovating, improving, preserving, equipping, and furnishing the former Crescent View Middle School Property, or portions thereof, for community, recreation, arts, cultural, park, open-space, trail, municipal, and related public purposes, including parking, site and utility access, and all related improvements; said Bonds to be due and payable in not to exceed twenty one (21) years from the date of issuance of the Bonds?

Property Tax Cost of Bonds: If the Bonds are issued as planned a property tax sufficient to pay debt service on the Bonds will be required over a period of twenty one (21) years in the estimated average amount of \$59.98 per year (\$5.00 per month) on a \$739,100 primary residence and in the estimated amount of \$109.06 per year (\$9.09 per month) on a business property having the same value.

The foregoing information is only an estimate and is not a limit on the amount of taxes that the Council may be required to levy to pay debt service on the Bonds. The Council is obligated to levy taxes to the extent provided by law in order to pay the Bonds. The amounts are based on various assumptions and estimates, including estimated debt service on the Bonds and taxable values of property in Sandy City, Utah.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

Constitutional Amendment A.

Shall the Utah Constitution be amended to change how proposed constitutional amendments are published, requiring publication for 60 days immediately before the general election in a manner established by state law instead of in newspapers?

If voters approve Constitutional Amendment A, state statute would change to require the Lieutenant Governor to publish the full text of all proposed constitutional amendments and other ballot questions from the Legislature, on the Utah Public Notice Website and on the Lieutenant Governor's website for 60 days immediately before the general election.
