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ABOUT SALT LAKE COUNTY HEALTH DEPARTMENT

As a division of the Salt Lake County Human Services Department, the Salt Lake County Health Department (SLCoHD) works to protect and improve the well-being of all county residents by preventing disease, illness, and injury and by impacting social, economic, and environmental factors fundamental to excellent health. While some county divisions provide services only to residents living within unincorporated areas, the SLCoHD is charged with the responsibility of providing public health services to residents in both incorporated and unincorporated areas.

The structure of governmental public health agencies at the state and local levels varies considerably across the country. Utah has established a decentralized organizational model for public health in which local public health agencies are organizationally independent of the Utah Department of Health and are primarily governed by local boards of health. The Utah Legislature established these “local health departments” under Title 26A of the Utah Code.

State law requires local health departments to have a policy-making Board of Health (BOH); the SLCoHD has a 15-member board appointed by the Salt Lake County Mayor, and county ordinance outlines the qualifications for board members. The BOH is responsible for setting public health policy for the department and may adopt and enforce public health rules, regulations, and standards necessary to implement the public health policies. Standards and regulations adopted by the BOH supersede existing local standards, regulations, and ordinances.

The Board also approves the budget, which the health department submits to Salt Lake County. The county is responsible for setting administrative (personnel and fiscal) policies for SLCoHD. Our budget is comprised of federal and state funds, county general funds, and fees collected for department services. Approximately one-third of the budget comes from each of those sources.

FROM THE DIRECTOR



Public health has always meant doing more with what a community gives us, and 2025 asked us to prove that in new ways. As federal funding shifted beneath our feet and the demands on local health departments grew, our team stayed focused on what matters most: making sure every resident of Salt Lake County has access to the services that keep them safe and healthy. That commitment doesn't waver, even when the landscape around us does.

As we look back on 2025, our department navigated a year defined by change. In the second quarter, significant shifts in federal public health funding forced us to reexamine every program and partnership we support. Rather than treat this as simply a budget problem, we used it as an opportunity to ask a harder question: where is our work truly making a difference, and where are we duplicating effort that our community partners are already doing well? That process of finding efficiencies and identifying real gaps is reshaping how we plan for the future, and we believe it will make us a stronger, more focused department for it.

We also began consolidating our worksites this year, working toward a footprint that makes the best use of our health department buildings and facilities. This isn't just about saving square footage, it's about making sure our staff and the residents we serve can access services from spaces that are efficient, welcoming, and built for how we actually deliver care today.

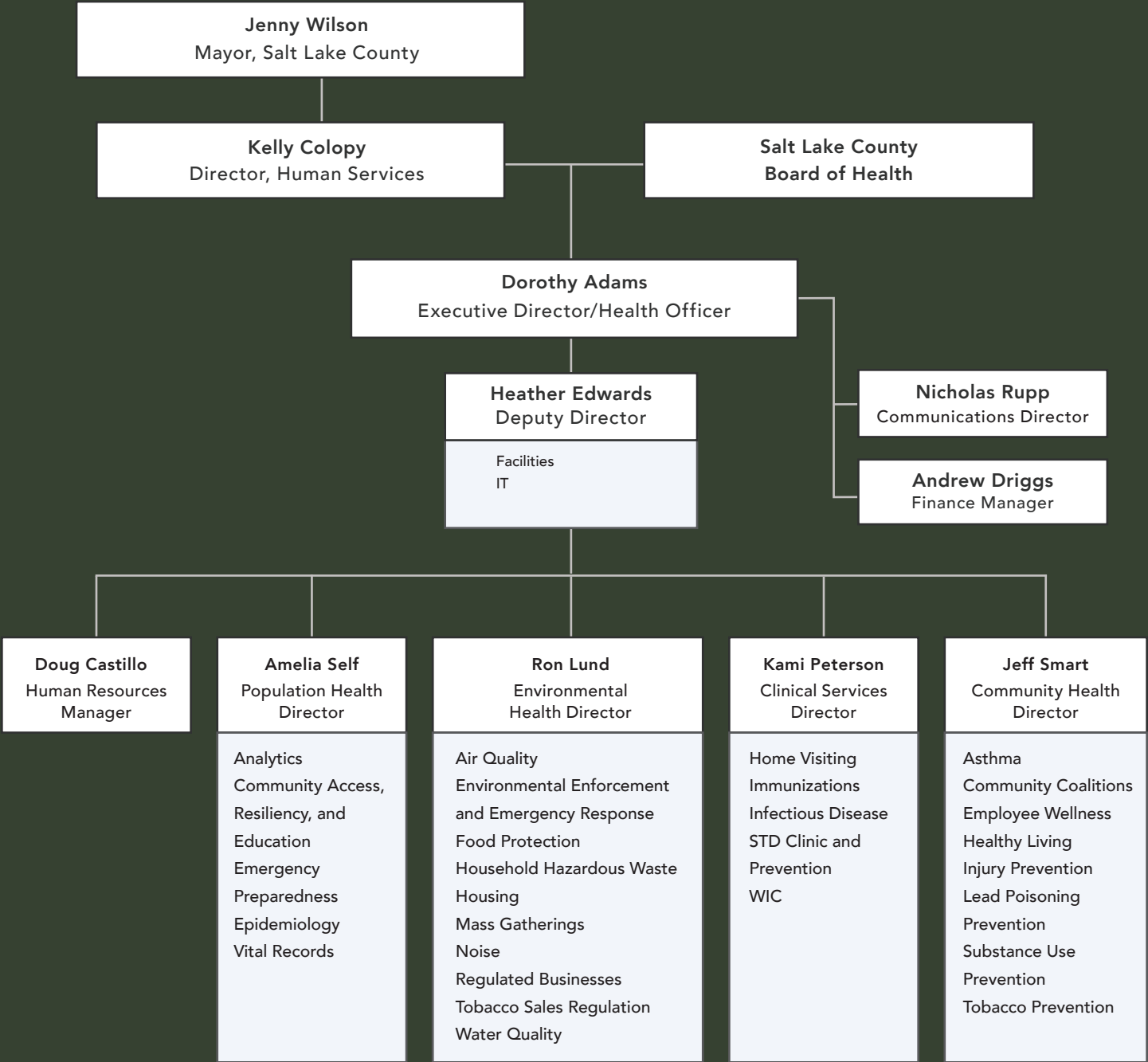
On the front lines of disease prevention, our teams prepared for and responded to real threats. As measles cases climbed across the country, we ramped up surveillance, provider education, and vaccination outreach to keep our county prepared for a local outbreak. Our epidemiology and clinical teams also managed cases of tularemia and plague in the county this year—a reminder that even rare and historic diseases remain part of the modern public health mission, and that the systems we maintain for rapid detection and response matter every single day, not just in a crisis.

This report reflects not only the work of our dedicated employees but also the invaluable support of our volunteer Board of Health, county and city leaders, and countless community partners. Together, we remain steadfast in our mission to protect and promote the health of every resident in Salt Lake County. Thank you for taking the time to learn more about our progress, and for joining us in building healthier, stronger communities.
