A weed is a plant that grows where it is not wanted. In Utah we have a list called Noxious weeds, when they are ignored they spread very quickly and cause big problems.


Some of them are poisonous to cattle, wildlife and sometimes humans. Some of them have very sharp stickers and thorns.

There is a law in Utah for land owners to take care of the Noxious weeds on their property. We all need to be aware of what weeds can do to our land and how we can get rid of them.

Parts of a Plant



Dyers Woad



This weed stands up to 4 feet tall.

The little yellow flowers turn into black seed pods that hang like ornaments.

The stems were used for making blue dye by the Pioneers.

It is very invasive and inedible.

Tall White Top

This 4 to 5 foot tall weed can have roots up to 10 feet deep.

It has hundreds of tiny white flowers.

The green leaves have jagged edges.

It takes over by pulling salt out of the ground that kills the good plants.



White Top

This weed grows up to 2 feet tall.

Like tall white top it has hundreds of little white flowers.

The curly leaves are dark green with little white hairs on them.

It makes animals sick if they eat it.



Leafy Spurge

This bad weed is 2 to 3 feet tall.

The flowers are lime green and explode when they are ripe.

Its long skinny leaves are blue green.

It has a milky sap that can cause blindness.

Canada Thistle

It grows 3 to 4 feet tall.

It has small lavender flowers.

Dark green leaves are very spiny.

It can grow new plants from roots and seeds.

Musk Thistle


This spiny plant is 4 feet tall.

It has big violet flowers.

It has dark green leaves with a light green rib in the middle.

Cattle won't eat the plant, but they eat the flowers.

Scotch Thistle



Yellow Star Thistle

It grows as tall as 3 feet.


The flowers are yellow with sharp spikes.

The leaves are blue-green with fuzzy stems.


It can kill horses if they eat it.




Thistle Flowers





Diffuse Knapweed




Russian Knapweed

This 2 foot tall weed has small purple flowers.

The gray-green leaves have deep notches.

It is very bitter and hurts horses when they eat it.

The roots grow up to 8 feet deep.



Squarose Knapweed

The rose colored flowers have little hooks to help them stick to things.

It's up to 4 feet around and looks like a tumbleweed when it's full grown.

It sends a chemical into the dirt so nothing else will grow.

Spotted Knapweed

This plant is 3 feet tall and some are 3 feet around.

The purple flowers have black spots on them.


It has fuzzy green leaves with deep notches.

It chokes out all the good plants that animals eat.


Knapweed Flowers





Dalmation Toadflax


This weed is 3 feet tall.

It has light green heart-shaped leaves.

It crowds out all of the good feed for animals.



The flowers are bright yellow and orange.



Field Bindweed

This vine grows from seeds and roots. It has dark green arrowhead shaped leaves.



It has white funnel shaped flowers. The seeds last over 60 years in the ground.

Nedusa Head

This skinny grass is almost 2 feet tall.

The sharp seeds can injure the eyes and mouths of livestock.

It has silica in it so livestock and wildlife can't eat it.

Houndstongue

This weed is 2 to 3 feet tall.

It has small purple flowers that turn into prickly little seed buttons.

The rounded green leaves can be up to 12 inches long.

It is poisonous to cows and horses.

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
