00:00	Welcome from Sim Gill and Approval of Minutes
00:40	DA Sim Gill acknowledged the transitions of Council Member Max Burdick, Representative from Department of Corrections Mike Haddon, and Representative Eric Hutchings. Thanked them for all of their support in Criminal Justice Reform and their role on the Criminal Justice Advisory Council (CJAC) board.
04:02	Chief Matthew Dumont motioned to approve the October Minutes. Chief Jack Carruth second the motion. All were in favor.
05:03	The Development of South Salt Lake's Civilian Review Board Materials: SSL Webpage & Draft Proposed Ordinance
05:20	Chief Carruth speaks on the established Civilian Review Board to improve communication between the Police Department and the community, to help ensure police accountability and credibility with the public. Encouraging discussions within police force about use of force, systemic racism within law enforcement, how to engage communities, to accurately review practices within the force.
24:11	Questions from the committee: <ol style="list-style-type: none">Will there be a law enforcement advisor attached (who is non-voting)? -Yes. There will also be a city attorney to answer legal questionsDue process- The review board will not have subpoena powers; they will not see cases until the chief finalizes the cases. They are there to determine if they agree on how the police handled the situationWould the Board have the ability to refer any matters to the prosecution? – Yes, they would have the power to defer to the District Attorney's officeDefining "Use of Force" - They have updated anything above uncooperative handcuffing policy with pointing of taser and discharge of pepper spray. (not removal of pepper spray from holster)

35:20	The Justice Lab team from University of Utah College of Law have put in 600 hours and multiple interviews since the last meeting with CODA. They have found many people cannot access criminal justice services because of a lack of ID (stolen, lost,

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	<p>no birth certificate, no social security card) Most people remain homeless until they can get an ID, an often-impossible task for those experiencing homelessness. Due to COVID-19 there has been increased difficulty for people to get ID's.</p> <p><u>Solutions:</u> need people and groups dedicated to helping people get IDs, resource centers need more resources, the time it takes to get an ID needs to be cut.</p> <p><u>Long-term solution:</u> dedicated team to continue working on this</p>
44:00	<p>Questions from committee:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. Can we create a county-based ID for vulnerable people so that they can access some of these resources? An ID that would allow them only access to these services. b. Officer Matt Dumont: working with Driver's License division to set aside time to get state IDs' for this population c. Rep. Eric Hutchins: There should be access to a 2nd tier state ID. Using caution that there will not be identity fraud. d. Rep. James Dunnigan: worked with incarcerated individuals and the Driver's License division to take individuals to the Weigand Center to get an ID. The IDs' need to be credible enough to get a job. He is interested in getting involved with this project. e. Look for ways to streamline the different cross sections that this affects: Criminal Justice, Pre-Trial Services, Social services, f. Laura Scott with Felony Drug Court: raises issue that cost can be a barrier for clients (look at cost compared to how much it costs to incarcerate individuals per day \$100/day v \$15) g. 1:02:10	<p>Update: Court Operations and Problem Solving the COVID Period Case Backlog</p>
1:02:18	<p>Judge Laura Scott stated they are ready to reopen for criminal jury trials. Planning to restart in January. They have asked Criminal Judges to create lists of cases ready to go, prioritizing those being held on these cases. They are focused on a physical space, making it safe and appropriate for all. Worked with health experts to determine needs moving forward. The juror's health will be emphasized. Once the 60 jurors receive their summons, they will be provided information on testing and procedures around testing. There will be alternates in case anything comes up.</p>

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1:14:10	<p>Questions from Committee:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> a. When will this start? - Tentatively scheduled for mid-January b. What does the backlog look like? How will you get through all the cases? - the first month they will try to do 2 cases per court room per week (they have 2 large court rooms) Currently have 200 defendants that need to be seen. c. With the 25% transmission rate has there been an additional conversation with Dr. Miller from University of Utah about exposure risk? - the conversation has focused around a juror testing positive and having enough jurors to continue with the trial. Jurors will only be together in court room: they will be distanced and have masks on. They will not move forward unless it is deemed safe. d. Can people who work in the courts get prioritization of immunization so that they can begin this work? Consider coordinating a request prioritization for the courts to receive vaccinations to move along with the backlog of court cases.
